I hope there are not too many inaccuracies and that inclusions will be enthused over rather than omissions noted.


Personally I hope that the next fifty years will be as good as the last fifty.


THE PRESIDENT'S

Gavin Gillard for elevating/


relegating/levitating me to the bat/pad position which to this day I have been unable to escape.

old chipped, bumpy wicket which did duty before the introduction of the mat.

Some time after the discovery of Baker's Creek Gold Mine in 1887, Hillgrove took an active part in cricket, and Mr George Smith offered a valuable cup, to be played for between teams in Armidale, Hillgrove, Uralla and country teams. This competition, which was extended over three years, was the means of giving the game a fillip, and ultimately the Armidale team won the Cup, which was presented to the club at Hillgrove, at a dance given by Mr Smith and the Hillgrove cricketers.

The Armidale

Association was formally birthed on the 1/9/1899. The first competition was organised in two divisions:

Town: Armidale, Orientals,

Cricketers

Country: Black Mountain, Ollera, Guyra, Wandsworth,

Booralong.

For 1911-12 the junior competition included a Hillgrove side as well as sides from Brick Villa, De La Salle College and T.A.S. ******

In the 1947-48 midsummer competition additional teams were entered by Armidale Timber Co. and Hillgrove.

Armidale Cricket 1850 -98

Armidale has always been prominent, from a cricketing point of view, and for a town of its size has taken a leading position. In the early days, as far back as the fifties, several of the pioneers were cricket enthusiasts, notably the Marsh family of Salisbury Court and the Taylors of Terrible Vale. These stations each had a cricket team, and matches between these country teams and the town team were frequent; and in later years these contests still went on. Salisbury Court and Terrible Vale were the first to use the matting wicket, which was the means of materially improving the game, as good cricket was impossible on the

The formation of the Hillgrove cricket club came about in a somewhat accidental fashion.

Andrew and Esme Boundy had two daughters who played tennis and through this, they met the young Frost boys, Keith, John and Elvin.

Andy had watched these and other boys playing in the recreation ground with tennis balls and home made bats. He said he recognised a great deal of potential for a cricket

team and they showed interest when he spoke to them. Andy put a notice in Sam Martin's shop window and a number of the locals attended a meeting on the following Sunday morning. Hillgrove Cricket Club was effectively formed that morning.

When he lived in Newcastle Andy had

dealings with a sports firm called Reg. A. Baker. He contacted this firm and Reg. A. Baker agreed to supply all the gear needed on a hire purchase agreement. Total cost of bag, bats, balls, pads and gloves was 80 pounds. About \$170 in today's money. Matting for the wicket was also purchased. Money to pay off the gear was raised through raffles, dances, sweeps on own games and Test Cricket and the sale of cakes and hot soup sold at the dances.

The first game Hillgrove played was against a team from Richardsons, and was played at Hillgrove. In those days a great afternoon tea was supplied to the visiting team, set up

by ladies bringing a plate of sandwiches or cakes. Hillgrove was in "B" grade the first year and won the competition undefeated. To celebrate and for the presentation, a dance was held and all players were presented with a cap, dark green with the N.E.D.C.A. emblem.

Apart from the players, there was a number of other people who showed a lot of interest in the club and gave support. Among them were George Smith, Old Bill Frost, Ernie Edgar and Tom Faint and Alf Milner who drove most of the cricketers to games when they played in Armidale.

A wicket already existed, The Recreation Ground had been there for decades and a pitch laid down. Surrounding the pitch was an old bike track, and this became the boundary. The pitch was very old and not very even. It had been in existence for so long it was in a hollow. A fence surrounded the Recreation Ground and cows and sheep grazed on

the pitch. The cow dung would be picked up by the team on the morning before the game, using shovels and wheelbarrows.

The team decided a new pitch was needed and built one themselves after the first year. The ground was dug out to the depth of about one foot and the dirt replaced with ant bed material and puddled in with water.





The material was dug from alongside the road from Hillgrove to the main road from Armidale to Wollomombi, and trucked to the ground in Alf Milner's truck.

It was a good wicket, but got marked by the stock which grazed on the ground. Andy built a grader, made of wood with a piece of angle iron on the bottom to smooth the pitch before the mats were laid.

Esme Boundy was official scorer for the team and cooked the soup for sale at the dances in a four gallon kerosene tin.

The shed to house the gear was built after several years, and was designed and built by Old Bill Frost, with all team members help.



Apart from himself, Andy remembers the original team to be: Jim Frost, John Frost, Keith Frost, Elvin Frost, Herb Edgar, Jim Witherdin, Jack Sewell, Laurie Sewell, Alf Wayte, Bob McGregor, Mick McGregor, Norm Waters and Jack Waters.

He admits he may have missed some people, and lists the following names as those he played with. School teachers Tom Bowler, Gordon Baker, Bob Blevin, and Tom Lambert, Harold Upson, Bill Frost,

Blue Munday tells the story of a game at Lambert Park where the batsman kept hitting big sixes. Hillgrove put a fieldsman on the road. He duly caught the ball, threw it back to long on and, on the subsequent appeal for a catch, the batsman was given out.

Les Lawrence, Brian Lawrence, Brian Charter, Stan Ross and a brother, Keith Martin and Tom Dye. There are undoubtedly others, but at his age and after 50 years, and three strokes the memory is not as good as it was.

Asked to mention a few of the more funny episodes, Andy told of the social game where all the players were to be in fancy dress. Jim Frost played in Esme Boundy's ankle length evening dress and John Frost played in the school uniform of one of the Boundy daughters. He said Bob McGregor was not particularly happy facing fast bowling, and the faster the bowling became the more scared Bob became, and the harder he hit the ball.

One game, Hillgrove needed about fifty runs to win outright in about twenty minutes, and Keith Martin, captain at the time, opened the batting with Jim Frost and Keith Frost with Bob McGregor at number three. They got the runs with an over to spare. In this innings Jim Frost square cut a ball over point for six, the only time Andy saw this happen.

The two hardest hits Andy ever saw must have been good ones! Gordon Baker hit a ball from the northern end of the ground and it reached Jock Usher's fence, across the road and a spare block at the southern end. Bob McGregor hit a ball from the southern end of the pitch over mid off. It struck a pine tree half way up still rising.

He still thinks Bob McGregor was the hardest hitter he ever saw over all, but he says everyone in the team could hit balls over the fence, except him. In his cricket life, Andy never hit a six, and never scored a century, but made a lot of scores very close to it. His highest score was 97, given out lbw by an umpire from the opposite team to a bowler bowling round the wicket with one foot outside the wicket. It was the first time he had been struck on the pads.

One player, Mick McGregor, always wore his cap backwards, and on presentation night when the players were presented with their caps, Mick put his on backwards.



I got a job at the Services club. I had to do shift work on Saturdays starting at 3.00 p.m. so I had to give up cricket. I was 66. That was in 1978 against St Peters. We lost. I remember one game against Public Service. They made 200 plus. We were nine down with about 30 to get. Ray Sewell and terry Witherdin were batting and I was umpiring. Ray collapsed. He said "I can't go on Keith".

I had a couple of aspros in my pocket so I gave him those and got a glass of water. He kept going and we scored the runs!

Next day he went down with the chicken pox.

Before the war (in 1908) and again in 1922-23 the Half-holiday Cricket Club played on Wednesday afternoon. In those days a lot of blokes worked Saturday.

I remember Professor Dillon umpiring at Consett Davis. Ron Smith was the batsman. There was a great appeal for caught behind but the batsman was given the benefit. Ron said "I didn't hit it. It hit my glove." Professor Dillon didn't appreciate that much.

We played Bundarra once. They gave us a hiding. Afterwards we went down to the pub. We were all full when it came time to go home. Only time we played there. We played de la Salle at Lambert Park or West End Park in the

Morgan bowled well and took the last wicket -Tom Dye caught him behind.

TAS and de la Salle used to like to come to Hillgrove. They'd see tea and cakes like they never saw at boarding school. George Smith used to call out' "Tea's Ready!" as soon as the billy boiled and off the players would come ... whatever the time was.

Jock Usher would come over late in the day and we'd hear "You'll never get 'em out!"

There used to be five pubs at Hillgrove. Miners, like cricketers, always got dry throats.

Constable Blackman was the last policeman at Hillgrove. He used to score.

"I'll give 4 for that," he said one day when the ball was cut off well inside the boundary.

"It didn't go to the boundary!"
"I know that, but it was a fine shot."
No-one argued. He was the copper.
K. Morgan thought the blokes were having a good time going into town on the back of Keith Martin's truck.
Thought he'd better join them. He did (of course) and made up for lost time too!


Wollomombi imported a few Rosses for one game. We took them a few beers

before the game. They weren't as good as they could have been.


Obediah Frost went to play for Wollomombi. Could bat all afternoon and hardly trouble the scorers.

Hillgrove Cricket Club entered a reserve grade side in the Armidale competition in 1947. The president in that year was George Smith. The team included, Jim Frost, Keith Frost, Herb Edgar and Keith Martin. Hillgrove's inaugural season was a great success and the premiership was won.

The Grove won again in 1953 when they defeated High School. Scores for that game are shown below.

In the 1940/50 era a gentleman named Bill Boundy made cricket bats out of willow trees, which were used by Hillgrove cricketers. He would make them heavy or light according to specifications given to him. It can be assumed that he made extra wide bats for the openers.

The president in 1954 was Tom Dye with R. K. Martin treasurer and Les Lawrence secretary. R. K. Martin continued as treasurer until 1962 with the exception of 1960 when T. Witherdin did the job. Tom Dye was president until 1962 also, except for 1956 (L. Sewell). He was president again from 1972/73 till 1980/81.

Hillgrove won the reserve Grade premiership in the 1955/56 season with R. K. Martin as captain. Scores are shown below.

Annual games have been played against Manilla since 1958/59 for the Geoff Dowe Memorial Trophy. A Thames truck was used for transport to games. It had high sides (apparently so that high-spirited players wouldn't fall out). One story goes that the truck stopped once coming up the Moonbis. Jim Frost decided to inspect the carburettor, so he lit a match near it while it was being taken apart. Was he trying to blow himself up or trying to see what he was doing?

Herb Edgar was secretary from 1959/60 until 1962/63 and was secretary/treasurer from 1966/67 until 1980/81.

In the 1960/61 season Hillgrove entered two teams in the comp. for the first time. Below are the scores from a very exciting Reserve Grade match at the beginning of that season.

Public Service scored their runs off just 36 overs. Hillgrove looked gone at 8/173 but a ninth wicket partnership of 25 and a tenth wicket stand of 39 saw them to an exciting finish. Hillgrove's runs were scored off 53 overs.

Hillgrove won the Reserve Grade again in 1962 with De La Salle were 4-38 at the tea adjournment. The score went to 108 before the 5th wicket was lost - caught off K. Morgan. The next wicket was bowled by Morgan who finished with 5-22. Jim Frost bowled 18 overs and took 2-28. Noel O'Halloran took 2-12 off 11 overs. Jack Sewell was president from 1963/64, when K. Morgan was secretary treasurer, until 1971/72 - a stint of nine seasons. This compares with R. K. Martin's 8 seasons and Tom Dye's 17 seasons as president from 1954. Herb Edgar was secretary for 6 years and secretary/treasurer for 13 years. These gentlemen have been real stalwarts for the club and we owe them many thanks. Hillgrove Cricket Club has produced many representative players over the years. The player who has gone to the highest honours is Gavin Morgan. He is a member of the exclusive Emus Club - the cream of NSW. Country's young cricketers. Gavin went on a world tour with the Emus.



Hillgrove - Some historical perspective

The quiet little village that is Hillgrove today was not always that way. The Hillgrove that long time resident George Smith recalled was a hive of activity.


George who was born in Hillgrove in 1889 spent most of his life looking and working for the riches offered by the discovery of gold at Baker's Creek. He remembered Bracken Street as a hive of activity with eight big stores, five bakers, five butchers, two restaurants, a technical college, a few fruit and confectionery shops and half a dozen hotels. He recalled Saturday night shopping crowds blocking the street, the hotels ringing with the tunes of faraway lands and the travelling picture shows that visited Hillgrove regularly.

Hillgrove once boasted sporting bodies in cycling, horse racing, rugby union, rugby league and tennis, as well as cricket.

The fortunes of Hillgrove fluctuated with mine production and commodity prices. Today the mining activities continue even though the village is a 'ghost' of it former glory. One thing that does continue is the Hillgrove Cricket Club.



On 15th December 1956 Hillgrove played Dumaresq. Dumaresq was bowled out for 21. Keith Martin took 7 for 14. In reply Hillgrove scored 23, Roger Roan took 5 for 7. In the second innings Dumaresq scored 13 with Keith Frost taking 6 for 5 and Elvin Fost taking 3 for 8. In their second innings Hillgrove scored 35 and R. Milson took 7 for 10 including a hat trick. The Armidale Express reported, "Although the scores were not high both clubs agreed it ws the most exciting match they have played.

Main feature of the match was the bowling of Roger Roan who took 12 wickets for 17 runs including a hat trick.

Memories of Playing for the 'Grove, Alan (Joe) Sewell

My cricket started at High School, playing U 14 junior cricket. Other young budding cricketers were Dave Dye, Peter Schaefer, Ian Morgan and Bob Johnson. Ian was still at primary school and would open the bowling for us. Schaef and I played rep cricket and on one trip went to Maitland to play a representative side and to see the MCC play NSW at Newcastle. One of the highlights was meeting Doug Walters after his maiden test century against England.

I started playing cricket with Hillgrove B Grade in '67-'68 season and the players in the team then were, Peter Sewell, Ray Sewell, Greg Witherdin, Brian Charters, Laurie Sewell, Ross Sewell, Cyril Lawrence, John Waters and Norm Waters. Dumaresq beat us in the semifinal that year at Lambert Park and my best mate, Peter Schaefer, ruined any hopes we had of winning, by scoring a ton. '68-'69 and '69-'70 were building years. With Ian and Gavin Morgan hitting their straps and a couple of new players we hit the '70-'71 season hungry for a premiership. The team then was Ian Morgan, Gavin Morgan, Alan Sewell, Bruce Sewell, Ross Sewell, Dave Dye, Gary Northam, Stan Davies, Keith Worthing, Cyril Lawrence, John Leahy and Ben (Trooper) Little.

Kay, Ian, Gavin Morgan and myself



would train ferociously every chance we could in Morg's tennis court. John Stathers and Jack Sewell would also join in. This must have paid off as we won the '70-'71 one day final. The '71-'72 season was also a top one with wins in both the one day and two day comps.

After winning for two years it was time to move to Reserve Grade and as it turned out Schaef decided to join the 'Grove. The Reserve Grade players then were John Stahers, Kay Morgan, Jack Sewell, Peter Sewell, Keith Frost, Bill Frost, Elvin Frost, Herb Edgar, Keith Martin, Keiren Moore and some new recruits, Ian Morgan, Gavin Morgan, Peter Schaefer, Chris Pitkin, Phil Gibbons and Alan Sewell. Our first game was at Consett 3, Behind Lake Zot. I can still remember John Stathers and Gavin Morgan batting in the dark to get the winning runs. We won the one day final but lost the two day final in the '72-'73 season. The two day final against waratahs was one game we thought we could win, but a couple of terrible umpiring decisions put us in trouble and we never recovered. Schaef's 21st birthday party on the Saturday night was a great night and two kegs later and a few sore heads we were back on the field defending our first innings but it wasn't enough and Waratahs won.






5. Hillgrove Reserve Grade Premiers 1975 defeated Waratahs at Sports Ground.

They had a couple of good opening bowlers in Rod Darcy and Cyril Lawrence followed by Howard Munday and Rowan Chandler. Their batting was dominated by David Dye and Herb Edgar.

We made the final; against Hillgrove that year but fortunately it was a washout and a joint premiership was declared. They were the gun side. Little did I realise then that years later I would be with Hillgrove. A couple of years later we played Hillgrove Reserve Grade at Harris Park 2, where one of their players, a scruffy young teacher, went out of sight in Dumaresq Creek whilst retrieving a cricket ball. His name was David March with whom I was to share a house with and who obviously suggested I would be better off playing for the Grove. The first Saturday of my debut with Hillgrove was washed out and it was also the day of being inducted into the 'spirit of things' at the Royal. It was quite obvious that Hillgrove were a very social club.

In 1982-83 Hillgrove had only three teams. In 1983-84 the 'grove' entered 5 men's grades sides plus a woman's cricket side, representing a significant achievement in growth. Gary Phillips was one player I talked into coming across as it would do him good to play 1st grade and see how good he was. Gary has since played for Armidale and higher representation whilst becoming an integral part of Hillgrove. He was player of the year in the 1983-84 season.

That season the Club had a men's and a women's drinking side and it would be improper for me to replay some stories in this article be-



cause of censorship laws, but after all clubs were duly thrashed in the after games functions at the pubs etc. It was at a club function at Marchy's place that the men's team took on 25^{the} women's drinking side. The women won.



Scott Hourigan was so devastated and was never the same even settling down to get married and hardly drinking in later years.

Colin House was very much affected that he moved to Sydney mid season and I have not seen him since. David See was never the same and the old heads of Brizzy (Bob Kelly) and Hammo (Gary Hamilton) who to this day do not mention the incident.

Another character of this era was Mulga Fox, alias Greg Campbell, who captained 5th grade. Mulga in obviously a former life had com-




posed Winston Churchill's famous war time speech- "We'll fight them on the beaches" ... which Mulga re-released as the Hillgrove Anthem with much more passion and patriotic appeal as this was recited with such vigour as any opportunity arose.


Mulga was also a man of great foresight as he had argued strongly about writing to the Armidale Cricket Association to have spin bowlers banned from 5th Grade. Obviously, he had foreseen the deadly destruction a cricketer named Warne would unleash nearly a decade later. The 1984 off season saw Hillgrove Cricket Club enter 3 baseball teams - two men's and a mixed in the newly formed Armidale Baseball Competition. The Hillgrove "diggers" which included, Gavin Gillard, Harry Browne, Barry Reynolds, Paul Holding and myself won the competition.

Being President for the 83/84 Season wasn't only just restricted to playing, having a few meetings and making sure the Club was running but it involved other things such as writing and publishing "Dougie's Mate". This was a joint effort with Gavin Gillard, with Ken Docksey providing word processing facilities and Ross Bell allowing us to use his photocopier.

This wasn't the only document we wrote and for those who have read Gavin Gillard's article you will know we used to write the "Over the Pickets" by Slasher for Friday's Edition of the Armidale Express. Sometimes this took a lot of time involving late nights but it really gave us a buzz to be writing about any aspect of Armidale Cricket, sometimes contrary to our own beliefs, preferences and ideas. A typical week for Gavin and myself was a selection of teams along with all captains, organize and write Dougies Mate and Slasher, we may have played Rep. Cricket on the Sunday and throw in Armidale Cricket Association meeting, as I was publicity officer, the Weekly Radio Cricket show and it was a very hectic week. The season culminated in the release of the 1984 Hillgrove Yearbook which we managed to finish in time for Presentation Night. I remember we took a break to meet with Harry Browne at the St Kilda Hotel to "virtually sign" him and Warwick up for Hillgrove.

It was a pleasure to be part of Hillgrove and play cricket with the like of Peter Schaefer, Geoff Wood, Gavin Gillard, Tony Butler, and a true legend and gentlemen, Peter Hickey.







In 1984 I moved to Tamworth and joined Harry Browne's old club, South Tamworth.

The time spent with Hillgrove was unique. The spirit in 1983/84 was fantastic and it is pleasing to see "Dougies Mates" and Yearbooks have endured since. Congratulations to Hillgrove in its 50th Year. As you see it holds a special place of great times, friendships and memories albeit for the short time I spent with the Grove. All the best.



The Hillgrove Rock Oyster (17-12-83) Reference to the rock oysters still occasionally found in the more inaccessible sections of Baker's creek was made in a recent edition (1983) of that respected Grovian journal "Dougie's Mate". It reminds me of that great story, still often told, of the day in 1887 that Hillgrove (Elenora) played Armidale

At lunch on that historic day the "Grove was in a spot of bother. Dismissed for 26, despite the efforts of the local umpires, they took the field in some trepidation, yet determined to win. A player with the unlikely name of Smith opened the batting for Armidale. The first ball was despatched into the creek for 6, the next three deliveries all suffered the same fate. Consternation! The Hillgrove bowler whose name was strangely not mentioned in later match reports was under intense pressure. Indeed his very life was threatened by noisy spectators in the Chinese section of the ground.

Surely all was lost! But after the fourth foray into the crystal waters of the creek the Grovers returned not with the ball but two dozen rock oysters!!! and suggested lunch.

No-one could have imagined what an influence this suggestion was to have on the entire village and its history. The Armidale team headed by their big hitting opening batsman were despatched to find their own oysters. Sadly they must have searched in all the wrong places. Rocks were flung from the stream, frantically, dug and dredged. Alas, no oysters.

As darkness fell the Hillgrove team repaired to the Royal Hotel claiming victory by 2 runs. As for Smith and his team from Armidale, their consolation was digging the Bakers Creek Gorge . A game of cricket lost for the taste of a rock oyster!

Apparently the Hillgrove fourth grade cricket side gained the inspiration for their premiership win over Wollomombi from an unusual source.


The players were all fired up after reading Another Slip by Lango in the Express on Friday where the cricket scribe had Wollomombi already past the post and with the trophy in their hands.

The Barbed Wire Cup







For my birthday I will get some cricket gear, some pads and a bat, so I can use them next year.



This game was always going to be bigger than 'Ben Hur' playing a substantially strengthened UNE Vets team, we tossed, we won, we


